
Food parcels



Each weekend parents or carers collect a food parcel containing cooking oil, 2 x beef stock cubes, sugar, rice, maize meal, soap for clothes. Toiletries come once a month. In time for the school holidays a more comprehensive parcel is put together. The school has a committee who organise the packets and the distribution of it. Families are very grateful.

Distribution of donated hats and scarves – in school colours

Each year various volunteers in the UK knit countless hats and scarves for the learners at Amasango. And each year they are gratefully received by the learners. A careful log is kept of who has been issued what. The learners definitely appreciate the extra warmth during the winter months when the temperatures at night are often around freezing. Thank you to all who knit – not just these hats and scarves but baby clothes and blankets too.



Educational outing to Shamwari for all learners at Amasango



Throughout Term 2 all students attend a workshop and safari at Shamwari Game Reserve. This elite, private reserve opens its doors every year free of charge to Amasango. The outing begins with questions and quizzes identifying animal skulls, antlers and horns – also discussing their uses. Then, learners are introduced to the Born Free Foundation which rehabilitates and rescues large cats from all over the world. The highlight of the day is the 2 hour game drive where anything can be seen including antelope, zebra, elephant, giraffe and rhino.
